

Morning Summary: Stocks continue to steadily climb and remain within striking distance of all-time highs, despite ongoing trade disputes, global economic uncertainties, and a strong U.S. dollar. Impressive U.S. corporate earnings continue to keep stock prices well supported. A couple of big names reporting today are Disney and Snap. The trade is also eager to see the latest U.S. mortgage delinquency data from the Mortgage Bankers Association. There's just not a lot of economic data scheduled for this week. The big ticket items look like Chinese inflationary data out Wednesday night, and here at home, Friday's Consumer-Price-Index. From a macro perspective, bears are saying as trade tariffs have moved from rhetoric to action, the global supply chain is just now starting to feel and notice some negative changes. China, Europe and Mexico's economies showed fresh signs of stumbling last week. The trade is also wanting to figure out what the sanctions on Iran are going to mean for oil, global economies and trade going forward. Don't forget, Ohio's 12th District is holding a special congressional election today that is being highly watched and monitored by the trade. The resignation of Republican Representative Pat Tiberi forced the special election. It's now Republican Troy Balderson running against Democrat Danny O'Connor. This is important because many consider it the last set of tea leaves before the highly anticipated November midterm elections. Traditionally, Ohio's 12th district has voted heavily for Republican's, but recent polls show the Democrats are making it a somewhat close race. Several top political insiders are now saying the battle between Balderson and O'Connor could be a good illustration of what we'll see coming up in the fall mid-terms. This makes the trade very interested in watching how it all plays out. Many are saying most of the votes that will be cast won't be directly for either of the men actually running as candidates. Instead, Democratic candidate O'Connor will be receiving the majority of his votes from people who are simply voting against President Trump. Most of those casting votes for Republican candidate Balderson will simply be voting to show approval for President Trump and attempting to offset the so called "blue wave". Let's also keep in mind, the district is the home of Republican Gov. John Kasich, who butted heads with Trump during the 2016 presidential campaign. That's kind of important because Kasich's base lies in this District and might be reluctant to show up and cast a vote for Trump. From what I understand, there will be 66 congressional elections coming up in the November mid-terms where Republicans hold the current seat, but are in a District that tends to be less of a Republican stronghold than Ohio's District 12. In other words, considering the Democrats need to pick up just 23 seats, if they get the victory in Ohio tonight, it will make the market believe they have a real chance of making it happen in November. The current balance is 236 seats for Republicans, 196 seats for Democrats, and 6 vacancies.

Berkshires \$111 Billion Cash Surplus Might Be Telling Us Something? The trade is really starting to speculate on what Warren Buffett's Berkshire Hathaway is going to do with the massive cash surplus they are now sitting on. Berkshire's profits rose +67% for the second quarter and now the company is sitting on +\$111 billion in cash. Buffett said in his most recent shareholder letter that he was having difficulty finding good acquisitions at sensible prices. This is leading many analyst to think the company will soon start a massive stock buy-back program. Russ Mould, an investment director at AJ Bell, made an interesting statement, "M&A tends to peak when animal spirits are running high and often when executives feel

week in California and the Northwest as thousands of firefighters battle one of the largest fires in the history of the state. Longer-term, warm weather will continue across much of the northern and western U.S., with below-normal temperatures will settle in the South. As you can see below, it looks like wetter than normal conditions across the southern half of the U.S. will contrast with near to below normal rainfall in the North.



Corn prices are slightly higher this morning as traders continue to debate U.S. yields. Bears are saying recent rains have helped ease some of the stress in areas that have been battling the elements. Bulls are saying the rains have missed several important areas and the extreme heat is now clearly causing some complication. There's also talk that crops might underperform a bit as many have been hurried through the finishing cycle, ultimately pushing the crop to early maturity. From my perspective, it's all location, location, location. I have talked to many producers in several states who are estimating they will harvest their best crop ever. At the same time, there are others in similar locations who are telling a different story and talking about perhaps a more serious yield drag. The USDA decided to pull their weekly ratings back a bit with total conditions falling from 72% rated "Good-to-Excellent" down to 71%. States deteriorating the most were: Pennsylvania -10%; Missouri -7%; North Dakota, South Dakota and Texas -5%; Iowa and Tennessee -3%; Kentucky and Minnesota -2%; Nebraska -1%. Wisconsin was left "unchanged". Illinois, Kansas and Michigan up +1%; Indiana +2%; Ohio and North Carolina +5%; Colorado +9%. U.S. corn in the "dough" stage is reported at 57% vs. the 5-year average of 37%. Corn in the "dented" stage was reported at 12% vs. the 5-year average of 6%. There's no question the crop is running ahead of schedule.






Today In History



1947, Thor Heyerdahl -Norwegian anthropologist Thor Heyerdahl, completes a 4,300mile, 101-day journey from Peru to Raroia in the Tuamotu

Archipelago, near Tahiti aboard Kon-Tiki, a balsa wood homemade raft. Heyerdahl wanted to prove his theory prehistoric South Americans could have colonized the Polynesian islands by drifting on ocean currents. Kon-Tiki demonstrated that it was possible for a primitive raft to sail the Pacific with relative ease and safety, especially to the west (with the trade winds). The raft proved to be highly maneuverable, and fish congregated between the nine balsa logs in such numbers that ancient sailors could have possibly relied on fish for hydration in the absence of other sources of fresh water. Heyerdahl and his fiveperson crew set sail from Callao, Peru, on the 40-square-foot Kon-Tiki on April 28, 1947. The Kon-Tiki, named for a mythical white chieftain, was made of indigenous materials and designed to resemble rafts of early South American Indians. While crossing the Pacific, the sailors encountered storms, sharks and whales, before finally washing ashore at Raroia. Heyerdahl, born in Larvik, Norway, on October 6, 1914, believed that Polynesia's earliest inhabitants had come from South America, a theory that conflicted with popular scholarly opinion that the original settlers arrived from Asia. Even after his successful voyage, anthropologists and continued to Heyerdahl's belief. However, his journey captivated the public and he wrote a book about the experience that became an international bestseller and translated into 65 languages. Heyerdahl also produced a documentary about the trip that won an Academy Award in 1951. Following the Kon-Tiki expedition, Heyerdahl made archeological trips to such places as the Galapagos Islands, Easter Island and Peru and continued to test his theories about how travel across the seas played a major role in the migration patterns of ancient cultures. In 1970, he sailed across the Atlantic from Morocco to Barbados in a reed boat named Ra II (after Ra, the Egyptian sun god) to prove that Egyptians could have



Soybean bulls are happy to see the USDA finally reducing their crop-condition estimate. Prices were up double-digits in the overnight, but continue to trade around the \$9.00 level. Weekly ratings fell from 70% rated "Good-to-Excellent" last week down to 67% this week. States deteriorating the most are: North Dakota -9%; North Carolina -8%; Missouri -6%; Kentucky and Mississippi -5%; South Dakota -4%; Iowa and Tennessee -3%; Minnesota and Nebraska -1%; Illinois, Kansas and Louisiana "unchanged"; Indiana and Wisconsin +1%; Arkansas +2%; Michigan +3%; Ohio +7%. Soybeans "blooming" are reported at 92% vs. the 5-year average of 86%. Soybeans "setting pods" were reported at 75% vs. the 5-year average of 58%. From a historical perspective, I don't like reading that NOV soybeans tend to deteriorate in price from now through early-October. I'm hoping this year bucks the trend. I suspect a lot will depend on remaining August weather and how Chinese trade talks progress in Washington. I still see more extreme volatility on the horizon. Many professional

In 1977, he sailed the Indian Ocean in a primitive reed ship built in Iraq to learn how prehistoric civilizations in Mesopotamia, the Indus Valley and Egypt might have connected. While Heyerdahl's work was never embraced by most scholars, he remained a popular public figure and was voted "Norwegian of the Century" in his homeland. He died at age 87 on April 18, 2002, in Italy. The raft from his famous 1947 expedition is housed at the Kon-Tiki Museum in Oslo, Norway.

Irag's invasion of Kuwait on August 2. The order prepared American troops to become part of an international coalition in the war against Iraq that would be launched as Operation Desert Storm in January 1991. To support Operation Desert Shield, Bush authorized a dramatic increase in U.S. troops and resources in the Persian Gulf. Iraqi dictator Saddam Hussein calculated incorrectly that the United States and the United Nations, who were closely tracking Iraq's military buildup along Kuwait's borders, would not try to stop him. However, when Iraqi ground forces entered Kuwait on August 2, 1990, President Bush immediately proclaimed that the invasion "would not stand" and vowed to help Saudi Arabia and Kuwait in their efforts to force the Iragis from Kuwaiti land. On November 29, 1990, the United Nations Security Council authorized the use of "all means necessary" to remove Hussein's forces from Kuwait, giving Iraq the deadline of midnight on January 16, 1991, to leave or risk forcible removal. After negotiations between U.S. Secretary of State James Baker and Iraq's foreign minister, Tariq Aziz, failed, Congress authorized President Bush to use American troops in the coming conflict. Just after midnight on January 17 in the U.S., Bush gave the order for U.S. troops to lead an international coalition in an attack on Saddam Hussein's army. U.S. General Norman Schwarzkopf led "Operation Desert Storm," which began with a massive bombing of Hussein's armies in Iraq and Kuwait. The ensuing campaign, which is remembered in part for the United States' use of superior military technology, introduced the term "smart bombs" to the global vernacular precision-bombing devices aimed primarily at destroying infrastructure and minimizing civilian casualties. In response, Hussein launched **SCUD** missiles into Saudi Arabia and Israel. of SCUDs, Irag's use notoriously inaccurate weapons designed to terrorize civilian targets, nearly succeeded in inciting the Israelis to retaliate. Hussein hoped an Israeli military response would draw neighboring Arab nations into the fight on Iraq's side, but he again committed a grave miscalculation. Bush reassured Israelis that the U.S. would


protect them from Hussein's terrifying SCUD attacks and Israel resisted the urge to retaliate. Soon after, U.S. –installed Patriot missiles destroyed SCUD missiles in flight and further foiled Hussein's plan to goad Israel into a holy war.

Following an intense bombing of Baghdad, U.S.-led coalition ground forces marched into Kuwait and across the Iraq border. Regular Iraqi troops surrendered in droves, leaving only Hussein's hard-line Republican Guard to defend the capital, which they were unsuccessful in doing. After pushing Hussein's forces out of Kuwait, Schwarzkopf called a ceasefire on February 28; he accepted the surrender of Iraqi generals on March 3.



2005, Russian Sub Rescued- Russian Priz AS-28 minisubmarine, with seven crew members on board, is rescued from deep in the Pacific Ocean.

On August 4, the vessel had been taking part in training exercises in Beryozovaya Bay, off the coast of Russia's far-eastern Kamchatka peninsula, when its propellers became entangled in cables that were part of Russia's coastal monitoring system. Unable to surface, the sub's crew was stranded in the dark, freezing submarine for more than three days. At 1 p.m. on August 4, the Priz, trapped at 190 meters below the ocean surface, issued a mayday call. The Russian navy soon began to organize a rescue mission, asking for help from the United Kingdom, United States and Japan. In the ensuing days, the three countries mobilized rescue crews for the trip to eastern Russia. Initially, Russian admiral Fedorov first discussed using explosives to cut the antenna but those tactics were never employed. Then the Russian oceangoing MB-105 and KIL-168 attempted to lift the stricken craft to the surface using underslung cables. This attempt proved futile as well, meanwhile, to conserve energy and oxygen, the crew of the AS-28 shut down the submarine's non-essential systems (including the heater), donned thermal suits, rested. Finally, with fears mounting that the trapped crew's oxygen supply would soon run out, the six-man crew of a British-owned-and-operated Scorpio-45 rescue sub arrived and was able to cut the sub loose. All seven on board, which included six Russian navy seamen and one representative of the company that made the sub, survived the ordeal. The Priz incident occurred just five years after the Kursk, a Russian nuclear submarine, sank, killing all 118 people on board. In that disaster, the Russian government had delayed asking for outside help for some 30 hours and was widely blamed for the sailors deaths. As the disaster unfolded, Russian President Vladimir Putin stunned the public by failing to address the nation and even refused to cut short his vacation in light of the tragedy. It's worth noting that although Russians everywhere were relieved and happy that the Priz was successfully rescued, others could not believe that the Russian navy not acquired its own rescue



Wheat prices are once again higher this morning as bulls continue to talk about dry conditions and scorching heat moving across the European Union and other global weather complications. There's continued weather uncertainties in parts of Russia, Ukraine, Australia, Canada, China and India. Parts of Australia are actually enduring their worst drought in recent memory, while areas of India are reporting a -50% monsoon. Here at home, the latest weekly USDA crop condition data shows Spring Wheat down -4%, from 78% down to 74% rated "Good-to-Excellent". While this is much better than last year, it's still a more sizable deterioration than most in the trade where looking for. The U.S. Winter Wheat harvest is reported as 90% complete, which is slightly behind what most in the trade where forecasting. Arkansas, Illinois, Indian, Kansas, Missouri, North Carolina, Ohio, Oklahoma and Texas are all 100% complete; Montana is 44% complete vs. 61% average; Washington is just 49% complete vs. 60% on average. The U.S. Spring Wheat harvest is now seen at 13% complete vs. 14% on average. States running furthest behind are: Washington 16% complete this year vs. 30% on average; Idaho 6% complete vs. 18% average; Montana 8% complete vs. 12% average. North Dakota and Minnesota are 8% and 13% complete, which are right on their traditional pace; South Dakota is the only state running well ahead of schedule with 52% complete vs. 36% average. I remain a conservative bull, believing there is still more upside.





- > U.S. Beef & Pork Exports Still Strong In June: A record setting 272.6 million pounds of beef was exported from the U.S. in June. The number fell just short of an all-time high for any month of 272.8 million pounds in May. I'm told that beef exports were up almost 37 million pounds from year-earlier levels. Essentially, the first half of the year was up close to 15% compared to last year. Pork exports totaled 454.3 million pounds in June, which was the second highest on record for the month behind 2008's 461.3 million pounds and up 6.0 million pounds from last year.
- > Cotton Conditions Continue To Disappoint The Trade: Cotton conditions dropped another 3% this week to 40% down from a year earlier at 57%. What's interesting is poor to very poor is over double the 14% a year earlier at 32% and up 2% on the week.
- > Canada Sees New Record For Exports: Canada posted a new record for exports of its major grains and oilseeds in 2017-18 at 41.9 million tonnes, which compared with 41.6 million tonnes the prior year, according to a report from the Canadian Grain Commission. The total was well above the five-year average of 39.1 million tonnes, the report said. Significant increases in wheat and barley exports made up for a decline in canola sales, the Commission said. - > China Switches To Lower Protein... Cuts Soybean Imports: China can cut its soybean imports by 10 million mt in 2018 by expanding the use of low-protein feed, increasing imports of soymeal substitutes and by upping its domestic soybean production, researchers at the Chinese Academy of



My Own Personal Truisms

"Not To Trade, is often considered a good trading decision..."

I'm more of a long-term player, therefore you will not see me give many short-term suggestions or trade ideas. One of my most important rules is that I always follow my long-term direction. Therefore, as long as I am "bullish" a market I will only play that particular market in one of three ways.

- Option #1 Conservatively long.
- Option #2 Aggressively long.
- Option #3 Sitting on the sideline.

I never initiate a "short" position in a market that I am "bullish" longer-term, nor do I initiate a "long" position in a market I am "bearish" longer-term. **Northern Illinois -** I think it can be said that it is an assumed fact that fuller season corn will out yield an earlier corn. This year the corn all tasseled between July 4 and July 10. At that time, we had near perfect soil moisture. Now the rain has shut off and we could really use a rain. If in a normal year the fuller season corn will fill the kernel for a longer period. Will this year the yield difference between maturities closer because the shorter season corn was able to fill during a time where there was not moisture stress while the fuller season corn is under stress during its later fill time. Not sure I am asking this correctly, so I hope you know what I mean.

Northcentral Illinois – We are about 60 miles south of Chicago, the corn has looked good all year. In fact, we were thinking this yield has a good chance to handily beat last year. I have been out of town the last two and half weeks on vacation and I came back to brown grass in my front yard. I shut my sprinkler system off because it has been such a waste this year considering we have been getting rain every 3rd to 4th day until I left on vacation. We were out in the fields last night and we noticed the corn on the very best ground had leaves firing on the bottom. There really hasn't been a lack of moisture until the last 3 weeks. We have had ample rain or worse case too much rain at some points. The corn has literally not even been rolling during the day and still isn't. It's simply shedding the bottom two leaves, which I personally think might have something to do with shallow roots. Corn is in full dent now, so it could trim some bushels off, but we are not worried just yet. We are a little concerned that this heat will knock bean yield down a touch though.

Insight Into Ownership of Oil and Gas Rights for U.S. Farmers

I wanted to pass along some updated data form the USDA pertaining to oil and gas rights on farmland. We all know, high energy prices and major innovations in extraction methods have spurred annual U.S. production of oil and gas across America, many of which is occurring on farmland. The growth generated tens of billions of dollars in additional revenue for owners of oil and gas rights and increased the value of the rights. Unfortunately, ownership of oil and gas rights are often confusing and misunderstood by many. But they can have significant effects on the ability of farm operators and landlords to benefit financially from development and to shape development terms. In this recent study the USDA's Economic Research Service, tried to quantify the farm sector's oil and gas wealth and income, including the extent that farm operators and landlords own the rights to the oil and gas beneath their land, the value of the rights, and the timing and prevalence of leasing with energy firms. Keep in mind, oil and gas production is expected to grow by 23% from 2016 to 2025, which could be a game changer for some farms. Because the benefits and challenges regarding oil and gas production differ substantially for farm operators and non-operator landlords, I grouped key information seperately. It's worth noting that most farm operators and nonoperator landlords do not own the oil and gas rights associated with their land and are thus unable to receive payments. Farm Operators:

Most farm operators do not own the oil and gas rights associated with their land and are thus unable to receive payments. In the 1,080 counties with oil and gas production in 2014, only 10% of farm operators reported receiving oil or gas payments.

Farm operators owned \$19.1 billion in oil and gas rights in 2014.

Nationally, oil and gas rights generated \$3.8 billion in payments in 2014, equal to about 4% of net cash farm income. In Oklahoma, Pennsylvania and Texas payments represented almost 30% of those States' net cash farm income. In oil and gas counties, payments represented 11 percent of those counties' net cashfarm income, and in Oklahoma, Pennsylvania, and Texas, payments represented almost 30 percent of those States' net cash farm income.

In the oil and gas counties, 11 percent of farm operators reported owning oil and gas rights with positive value, and in Oklahoma and Pennsylvania, the share reached 14 percent.

Non-Operator Landlords:

Non-operator landlords reported holding \$13.8 billion in oil and gas rights in 2014. Nationally, about 5 percent of non-operator landlords owned these rights, and for those with land in oil and gas counties, that share was 13 percent.

Oil and gas payments generated \$3.6 billion for these landlords in 2014 and represented large shares of net cash farm income: 17 percent nationally, 37 percent in oil and gas counties, and 60/70 percent in Texas and Oklahoma, respectively. For landlords, "net cash farm income" comprises rent and other payments, including oil and gas payments.

Although non-operator landlords owned only 31 percent of total farmland in 2014, they received about 49 percent of total oil and gas payments going to farmland owners. One possible explanation is that non-operator landlords are more likely than farm operators to lease out their oil and gas rights or to negotiate lease terms that provide greater compensation.







Life may not be the party we hoped for, but while we are here we might as well dance. We all need a Tree!


