

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
Morning Summary: Stocks are poised to open higher but remain in a narrow trading range up near the all-time highs. Bulls are talking about possible optimism in regard to Chinese trade negotiations. From what I understand, Washington is reaching out to China for a new high-level round of trade talks, in an effort to give Beijing another opportunity to address U.S. concerns before it imposes new tariffs on Chinese imports. Insiders are saying this would be a high level meeting and if arranged could perhaps lead to some movement or perhaps a realistic resolution. I'm certainly not holding my breath, but it is good to see some type of talk and movement in a positive direction. Don't forget, there's scheduled to be a wave of economic data released from China later this evening, so we should know more in the morning about how the Chinese economy is holding up. The Fed's Beige Book released yesterday, which is a snapshot of the U.S. economy reported from discussions with business contacts in the Fed's 12 districts, showed that U.S. business are starting to become a bit more worried about the trade war with China and tensions with other major trading partners. In several districts, the Fed said, businesses reported scaling back or postponing investments due to worries about the trade outlook. Despite the trade tensions, the Fed said the economy was expanding at a moderate pace and a tight job market has led to labor shortages across the country and in many occupations. Many believe the tight job market in the U.S. will eventually start pushing wages more aggressively higher. The higher wages along with higher fuel costs at the pump could really start to spark inflation. In turn the Fed may have no choice but to become more aggressive in hiking interest rates. The have already hiked rates twice this year and most are thinking it will happen two more times in 2018. the next interest rate hike coming after the next Fed monetary policy meeting scheduled for Sept. 25-26. Beyond there, we probably get another rate hike in December and perhaps two or three more in 2019. Lael Brainard, a key Fed official, gave a speech yesterday to the Detroit Economic Club, saying " "With fiscal stimulus in the pipeline and financial conditions supportive of growth, the shorter-run neutral interest rate is likely to move up somewhat further, and it may well surpass the longerrun equilibrium rate for some period." From my perspective, that means she and perhaps other Fed officials are not scared of raising interest rates higher than some in the market may be anticipating. As for today, we will hear the latest monetary policy announcements form the Bank of England, the European Central Bank and Turkey. Most are looking to see if there is any talk of contagion. I suspect most of the media headlines here at home will focus on hurricane Florence as it barrels toward the Carolinas and nearly 1.5 million people are under mandatory evacuation. It's also estimated that +10 million people are under a warning or watch. Not only are they calling form torrential rains and high winds, but now there's talk of tornadoes being possible today in eastern North Carolina. From what I understand, the storm looks like it will stall out as it takes a slow southern turn once it hits landfall. It's been downgraded to a CAT 2 with the eye breaking up a bit. As our weather guru's suspected early on, it will be the rains and flooding that will probably be the most dangerous. Most are thinking the rains could last for four days and bring +40 inches for some areas. There were some pics floating around that were recently shared by NASA. It's a view of Hurricane Florence taken from a high-definition camera outside the International Space Station. The National Hurricane Center said wave heights in the worst part of Florence are as high as 83 feet. NASA called the view of Florence from the Space Station "stark" and "sobering."





America Is Now The Worlds Largest Oil Producer! Move over Russia and Saudi Arabia. America has reclaimed its throne atop the oil world. For the first time since 1973, the United States is the world's largest producer of crude oil, according to preliminary estimates published on Wednesday by the Energy Department. U.S. output kept climbing in June and August, reaching nearly 11 million barrels per day. That nudged the United States ahead of Russia for the first time since February 1999, the EIA estimates. The United States isn't expected to cede its crown any time soon. The EIA expects US oil production to stay ahead of Russia and Saudi Arabia through 2019. Many oil experts suspect the U.S. will be producing 13 million barrels per day fairly quickly and producing 15 million barrels per day well within the next decade. I personally suspect electric vehicles and alternative fuels may have some influence on that type of number, but perhaps I'm wrong, time will tell... I thought the graphic below was really cool. Weather on the Plains is seeing mostly dry windy weather promoting a return to fieldwork in areas that have received heavy rain in recent days. In addition, late season warmth is overspreading large sections of the Plains in advanced of an approaching cold front. Today's high temperatures will top 90 degrees F as far north as South Dakota. In the Corn Belt, favorably dry weather prevails, although lowland flooding persists in parts of the Mississippi and Ohio Valleys. Warmth is returning across the upper Midwest, helping to dry out still soggy fields. In the South, producers in the path of Hurricane Florence are harvesting corn and other crops and preparing farm operations for the approaching storm. Elsewhere, heavy showers and local flooding continue in southern Texas. Hurricane Florence is expected to make landfall as a major hurricane, resulting in potentially devastating coastal damage due to wind, waves and storm surge. Total rainfall could top 20 inches in parts of the southern Mid-Atlantic region.

It's Officially Peak Hurricane Season: This graphic clearly shows it tis the season. The five day tropical weather outlook shows hurricane Florence, hurricane Helen, hurricane Issac and two tropical depressions — 95L (in the Gulf of Mexico) and 96L all brewing. The other graphic shows the maximum rainfall caused by Tropical Cyclones giving you an idea of the potential rainfall that you could expect in your state. The map shows current state rainfall record form tropic cyclones from 1950 through 2017 and was compiled by meteorologists at the NOAA.

Today In History



1814, Francis Scott Key - Key writes a poem which is later set to music and in 1931 becomes America's national anthem, "The Star-Spangled

Banner." The poem, originally titled "The Defence of Fort McHenry," was written after Key witnessed the Maryland fort being bombarded by the British during the War of 1812. Key was inspired by the sight of a lone U.S. flag still flying over Fort McHenry at daybreak, as reflected in the now-famous words of the "Star-Spangled Banner": "And the rocket's red glare, the bombs bursting in air, Gave proof through the night that our flag was still there." Francis Scott Key was born on August 1, 1779, at Terra Rubra, his family's estate in Frederick County (now Carroll County), Maryland. He became a successful lawyer in Maryland and Washington, D.C., and was later appointed U.S. attorney for the District of Columbia. On June 18, 1812, America declared war on Great Britain after a series of trade disagreements. In August 1814, British troops invaded Washington, D.C., and burned the White House, Capitol Building and Library of Congress. Their next target was Baltimore. After one of Key's friends, Dr. William Beanes, was taken prisoner by the British, Key went to Baltimore, located the ship where Beanes was being held and negotiated his release. However, Key and Beanes weren't allowed to leave until after the British bombardment of Fort McHenry. Key watched the bombing campaign unfold from aboard a ship located about eight miles away. After a day, the British were unable to destroy the fort and gave up. Key was relieved to see the American flag still flying over Fort McHenry and quickly penned a few lines in tribute to what he had witnessed. The poem was printed in newspapers and eventually set to the music of a popular English drinking tune called "To Anacreon in Heaven" by composer John Stafford Smith. People began referring to the song as "The Star-Spangled Banner" and in 1916 President Woodrow Wilson announced that it should be played at all official events. It was adopted as the national anthem on March 3, 1931. Francis Scott Key died of pleurisy on January 11, 1843. Today, the flag that flew over Fort McHenry in 1914 is housed at the Smithsonian Institution's Museum of American History Washington, D.C.






Five-Day Graphical Tropical Weather Outlook


Corn bulls are scratching their head as the USDA catches the trade by surprise, raising their record August yield estimate of 178.4, even higher to 181.3 bushels per acre. In the stroke of a pen or tap on the keyboard this added another +241 million bushels to total U.S. production, which is now forecast at 14.827 billion bushels. Among the major producing states where yields are forecast to be record high are: Illinois, Iowa, Nebraska, Indiana, Ohio, and South Dakota. If there was good news to digest, again it all came from "demand". Feed and Residual was raised higher by +50 million bushels; Exports also raised higher by +50 million bushels; Ethanol raised higher by +25 million bushels. Unfortunately, the jump in demand just isn't enough to offset the jump in yield, hence, total ending stocks are raised higher by +90 million bushels to 1.774 billion. Foreign corn production is also forecast higher than last month with projected increases for the EU, Angola, Paraguay, Turkey, and Serbia more than offsetting declines for Canada, South Africa, and Guatemala. Corn exports for 2018/19 are raised for Ukraine, Serbia, and Paraguay, but lowered for Canada and South Africa. Global corn stocks, at 157.0 million tons, are up +1.5 million from last month. The seasonaverage corn price received by producers is now projected -10 cents lower with a midpoint of \$3.50 per bushel. As I mentioned the past several days, I just couldn't get my head around the majority of the trade looking for a reduction in yield, especially considering how big of step the USDA took in August to bump it higher. Just didn't make sense that they would immediately backpedal with fairly cooperative weather in play. From a technical perspective, the bears believe the market is eyeing the contract low at \$3.50^2 posted back on July 12th. As both a producer and a spec, I continue to believe it's only a matter of time before we post another leg lower, perhaps a break into

Mexican government had once controlled Texas and refused to recognize the American claim on the state or the validity of the Rio Grande as an international border. Viewing Taylor's advance as an invasion of Mexican soil, the Mexican army crossed the Rio Grande and attacked the U.S. forces in Texas in April 1846. By mid-May, the two nations were formally at war. The Mexican army was larger than the American army, but its leadership, training, and supplies were all inferior to those of the U.S. forces. Mexican gunpowder was notoriously weak, and cannon balls from their guns just bounced slowly often across battlefields where the American soldiers simply stepped out of the way. As a result, by January 1847, General Taylor conquered California and the northern Mexican territories that would later make up much of the American southwest. But Taylor was reluctant to take the war into the heart of Mexico, and Polk instead turned to General Winfield Scott to finish the job. In March, Scott landed nearly 12,000 men on the beaches near Vera Cruz, Mexico, captured the town, and began to march inland to Mexico City. Flanking the Mexican defenses at Cerro Gordo Pass, Scott stabbed southward below Mexico City, taking the towns of Contreras and Churubusco. When a final attempt at peace negotiations failed in August, Scott advanced north on the Mexican capital. After Scott's forces stormed the fortress at Chapultepec, the last significant Mexican resistance was eliminated. The next day, September 14, Scott marched his army into Mexico City and raised the American flag over the Mexican National Palace-the "Halls of Montezuma" later celebrated in the famous Marine's Hymn. For the first time in U.S. history, the Stars and Stripes flew over a foreign capital.

Soybean bulls see the balance sheet expand, as the USDA bumps their new-crop yield estimate to a fresh new record high, from 51.6 to 52.8 bushels per acre, adding another +107 million bushels to total U.S. production. On the demand side of the equation, exports were left "unchanged", while "domestic crush" was raised higher by +10 million bushels. In summary, total U.S. ending stocks were bumped higher by +60 million bushels from 785 million to massively burdensome 845 million bushels. Global soybean production was increased +2.2 million tons, with larger crops for the U.S. and China that are partly offset by lower projections for Canada, India, and Uruguay. China's 2018/19 soybean imports are reduced -1 million tons to 94 million as slower growth in protein meal demand and lower crush in 2017/18 continues into the next marketing year. Global 2018/19 soybean ending stocks are projected +2.3 million tons higher, with increased stocks for the U.S. and Argentina that are partly offset by reduced stocks for Brazil. The 2018/19 U.S. season-average soybean price on the farm is now forecast at \$7.35 to \$9.85 per bushel, down -\$0.30 at the midpoint. The good news is prices on the board didn't collapse, in fact, they actually rallied a bit higher. I personally don't think it had anything to do with the USDA report, as most were

Day War of 1967, Israel seized control of the West Bank, East Jerusalem, the Gaza Strip, the Sinai Peninsula, and the Golan Heights. Israel permanently annexed East Jerusalem and set up military administrations in the occupied territories. Israel let it be known that Gaza, the West Bank, the Golan Heights, and the Sinai might be returned in exchange for Arab recognition of the right of Israel to exist and guarantees against future attack. The Sinai was returned to Egypt in 1979 as part of an Israeli-Egyptian peace agreement, but the rest of the occupied territories remained under Israeli control. A faction of Israelis called for permanent annexation of these regions, and in the late 1970s nationalist Jewish settlers moved into the territories as a means of accomplishing this aim. Israel refused to open direct talks with the PLO, but in 1991 Israeli diplomats met with a joint Jordanian-Palestinian delegation at the Madrid peace conference. In 1992, Labor Party leader Yitzhak Rabin became Israeli prime minister, and he vowed to move quickly on the peace process. He froze new Israeli settlements in the occupied territory and in January 1993 authorized secret negotiations between Israel and the PLO in Oslo, Norway. These talks resulted in several important agreements and led to the historic peace accord of September 13, 1993. On the South Lawn of the White House that day, Israeli Foreign Minister Shimon Peres and PLO foreign policy official Mahmoud Abbas signed the Declaration of Principles on Interim Self-Government Arrangements. The accord called for the withdrawal of Israeli troops from the Gaza Strip and the West Bank town of Jericho and the establishment of а Palestinian government that would eventually be granted authority over much of the West Bank. President Bill Clinton presided over the ceremony, and more than 3,000 onlookers, including former presidents George Bush and Jimmy Carter, watched in amazement as Arafat and Rabin sealed the agreement with a handshake.





As you can see in the graphic below, 10 states are estimated to harvest a record high yield, including big production states like: Iowa, Illinois, Nebraska, Indiana and Ohio.




September 1, 2018 Soybean Yield Bushels and Change From Previous Month





Wheat bulls take another blow to the chin as prices are pressured to multi-week lows. The USDA left the U.S. balance sheet "unchanged" with ending stocks at 935 million bushels. But global wheat supplies for 2018/19 were raised +4.7 million tons. Also creating a bearish tone, was the USDA raising their Russian crop estimate by +3.0 million tons on improved spring wheat conditions. Kazakhstan was raised higher by



+0.5 million tons, also on excellent spring wheat conditions. Production is increased +2.7 million tons in India to a record 99.7 million on updated government data. These increases are partially offset by a -2.0-million-ton decrease in Australia and a -1.0-million-ton decrease in Canada, both reflecting continued dry conditions during the growing season. The good news is, exports out of both Australia and Canada were lowered. Unfortunately, with total supplies rising faster than use, global ending stocks are raised +2.3 million tons to 261.3 million and well ahead of most estimates, but are still -5% below last year's record. The season-average farm price range is unchanged at the midpoint of \$5.10 per bushel and the range is narrowed \$0.20 per bushel to \$4.70 to \$5.50. As I've been saying, I see no need to be in a nearby hurry to be buyer. As a producer we've made some terrific sales and are actually somewhat oversold with +50% of our estimated 2019 production already priced. As a spec, I like the longer-term bullish story, but believe there could still be more downside nearby.



I'm more of a long-term player, therefore you will not see me give many short-term suggestions or trade ideas. One of my most important rules is that I always follow my long-term direction. Therefore, as long as I am "bullish" a market I will only play that particular market in one of three ways.


- Option #1 Conservatively long.
- Option #2 Aggressively long.
- Option #3 Sitting on the sideline.

I never initiate a "short" position in a market that I am "bullish" longer-term, nor do I initiate a "long" position in a market I am "bearish" longer-term. April and it has been well-received. Live markets will also be shut in the regions. The 10 areas under the new ban slaughtered a combined 217 million hogs in 2016, around one-third of the country's total. 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Northern Iowa – I have been traveling around the state of Iowa and parts of Minnesota and I have seen a lot of incredible corn yields and fields. Same story in soybeans but better. There are areas of the state that are drown out but I'm promising you that there are much larger areas that are going to make up for those drown out spots in spades. One thing I have heard that I thought you might find interesting is there's some rumblings about cob rot and black corn. I have only heard this in areas that had the large amounts of rain. I have heard that it's as bad as 40% damage and dock from the elevator. My guy at the elevator didn't even want the corn but they took it as a favor to the farmer. I think they will probably just blend it off and it will come out clean leaving the farmer receiving next to nothing for his corn while the elevator pushes it down the road clean as a whistle. I have heard other cases were the cob rot was nearly insignificant; like less than 1%.

Central Missouri – We are farming 30-40 miles outside of Kansas City and we were lucky because we didn't get hit as hard with all this drought as what some guys did. With that being said, we are still in drought conditions, but I have heard of worse scenarios. I am about 15-20% done with my corn and we are messing around with a broken-down machine but we should get rolling by tomorrow at the latest. There are a few good things about my situation, the first is I'm 100% sold or maybe more at a higher level then we are currently trading at. The second is we should get a little insurance at the yield we are combining unless it improves a little.

Eastcentral Nebraska – I have included a picture of soybean we pulled out of a field next to my house, near Tarnov, Nebraska. One of the plants has 197 pods while the

other all have at least 125 pods or more per plant. We used a wrench to measure the stem and it's 5/8 of an inch on most plants. None of these plants are tall either, as you can see from the picture they are putting pods on tight. I didn't go out and cherry pick these plants this is a real field vision of a large field. This field is a group 2.7 maturity that was planted in 20-inch rows. The population was 135,000 seeds per acre. We used a biological seed, soil and foliar treatments.






What You Need To Know About "African Swine Flu" In China

China is currently the epicenter for the latest bout of African Swine Flu (ASF) and officials there are scrambling to contain the epidemic. Earlier in the week the number of culled hogs stood at +40,000 in an attempt to contain the disease from spreading through the world's largest pig herd. China has about 700 million pigs, which is an incredible half of the world's swine population. We have to keep in mind, pork is the country's primary protein source. I'm told based on the distances between infected


locations, some officials believe the flu may have entered the processed food system, making final containment significantly more challenging. ASF can spread very rapidly in pig populations by direct or indirect contact and can persist for long periods in uncooked pig products, facilitating its introduction into new areas, which is what has most officials worried moving forward. Of particular concern is that it is believed most producers in China are not trained or prepared to catch the disease in its early stages, leaving the door open for potential spreading outside China's borders. Keep in mind, a wider spread of the virus carries huge implications, especially for the Philippines, Thailand and Vietnam, which have large pig industries, with Vietnam being at greatest risk as it shares a border with China and the two engage in significant amounts of trade. Bottom line, tracking infected meat and meat products from the pigs is key to fight the spread of the highly viral disease as it can survive in processed foods. This fact is clearly understood by the European Union which is trying to contain outbreaks which have already hit several countries in the central and eastern part of the bloc. I suspect this could become a major issue if China cannot shut it down quickly. From what I'm told by pork market experts, if things go bad, and I'm told with this disease it could, we could see the necessity of a 30% cull rate on the herds in China, which is based on previous containment efforts in Russia and Ukraine. Should this view play out it would leave a major void in China's number one consumed protein. Unfortunately, due to the current 78% tariff on U.S. pork heading into China, I don't think the U.S. will be big players in supplying their needs. However, other exporting nations will be and that will leave an overall void in global surplus. This would then open the doors for U.S. exporters and hopefully create enough reasons for prices to rally. We will continue to monitor the situation and headlines closely in the days and weeks ahead...stay tuned! (Source: scidiv, beefcentral, reuters)





CRISPR Could Soon Change Your Mood

Millions of Americans now take antidepressant drugs for depression, anxiety, chronic pain or sleep problems. For the millions of Americans who have clinical depression, roughly one third don't find relief with antidepressants. But now, researchers are trying a different approach to alleviate depression. Science has learned that depression is an extremely complex disease, and a combination of factors likely play causal roles. Serotonin, sometimes referred to as the "happy chemical" because it contributes to feelings of happiness, is produced by nerve cells and is thought to regulate mood and social behavior. Previously, researchers believed that reduced serotonin levels in the brain caused depression. The serotonin hypothesis of depression was first described in the 1960s. As this hypothesis was the main driver for depression research, the majority of antidepressant drugs were developed to target serotonin receptors in the brain, essentially aiming to boost serotonin, a chemical thought to regulate mood and social behavior. Using CRISPR technology, the scientists have been able to target an altogether different type of receptor called delta-type GABA receptors. They think that natural mood-boosting substances in the brain can target these receptors. The most commonly prescribed antidepressant drugs — such as Prozac, Paxil and Zoloft — were approved by the FDA more than 30 years ago. This new approach involves targeting GABA receptors with substances called neurosteroids, chemicals that occur naturally in the brain and are involved in emotional and motivational brain networks. Using CRISPR, they mutated the delta-type GABA receptors to isolate and test their role in brain functioning. Researchers at Washington University School of Medicine in St. Louis and Sage Therapeutics in Boston think it may be that special mix of reducing inflammation while activating these receptors that contributes to antidepressant effects. It's amazing to see what the new CRISPR/Cas9 gene editing technology can do and how researchers can now learn how particular drugs affect individual receptor subtypes. From Francis Scott Key to Jimi Hendrix... What You Might Not Know About The Star-Spangled Banner

It was on this day back in 1814 that Francis Scott Key penned a poem which was later set to music and in 1931 becomes America's national anthem, "The Star-Spangled Banner." With all the heated debate and discussion still surrounding athletes and the National Anthem, I wanted to pay special recognition and provide some facts and details: (Source: History.com)

"The Defence of Fort McHenry" - This was actually the title of Key's famous poem. It was written after he witnessed the Maryland fort being bombarded by the British during the War of 1812. Key was inspired by the sight of a lone U.S. flag still flying over Fort McHenry at daybreak, as reflected in the now-famous words "And the rocket's red glare, the bombs bursting in air, Gave proof through the night that our flag was still there."

The Actual Flag: In addition to a thunderstorm of bombs, a torrent of rain fell on Fort McHenry throughout the night of the Battle of Baltimore. The fort's 30-by-42-foot garrison flag was so massive that it required 11 men to hoist when dry, and if waterlogged the woolen banner could have weighed upwards of 500 pounds and snapped the flagpole. So as the rain poured down, a smaller storm flag that measured 17-by-25 feet flew in its place. "In the morning they most likely took down the rain-soaked storm flag and hoisted the bigger one," Leepson says, "and that's the flag Key saw in the morning." Today, the flag that flew over Fort McHenry is called "The Star Spangled Banner" and is housed at the Smithsonian Institution's Museum of American History in Washington, D.C. It is said this is one piece of American history that will never be loaned out or sent to another museum for sharing. Many call it our nations most prized possession

Fighting To Save A Friend - After one of Key's friends, Dr. William Beanes, was taken prisoner by the British, Key went to Baltimore, located the ship where Beanes was being held and negotiated his release. However, Key and Beanes weren't allowed to leave until after the British bombardment of Fort McHenry. Key watched the bombing campaign unfold from aboard a ship located about eight miles away. After a day, the British were unable to destroy the fort and gave up. Key was relieved to see the American flag still flying over Fort McHenry and quickly penned a few lines in tribute to what he had witnessed.

Becoming The National Anthem - The poem was printed in newspapers and eventually set to the music of a popular English tune called "To Anacreon in Heaven" by composer John Stafford Smith. People began referring to the song as


"The Star-Spangled Banner". Keep in mind however that America didn't have a national anthem until 1931—and it could have taken longer if not for a cartoon. In 1929, Robert Ripley published an item in his syndicated "Ripley's Believe It or Not!" cartoon pointing out the fact that America did not have a national anthem. After Ripley received many letters of backlash, he told these upset patriots that their efforts would be better spent writing their congressmen. This led to a five-million-signature petition asking Congress for a national anthem. It worked. In 1931, President Herbert Hoover signed a law making "The Star-Spangled Banner" the official national anthem of the United States of America.

The First Sporting Event - The "Star Spangled Banner" was first played at a baseball game in 1862 in Brooklyn, NY. It was first played at a World Series in 1903 in Boston.

1969 Woodstock Version - Often called the most iconic song of all time, Jimmi Hendricks rendition of the "Star Spangled Banner" played back in 1969 at Woodstock has become one of the most listened. Click HERE to listen and see Jimmi work his magic.

Best Super Bowl Star-Spangled Banner - Whitney Huston owns this spot amongst voters, for when she performed at the Super Bowl 25 in 1991. Whitney, at the peak of her vocal powers, roared through one of the best National Anthem performances ever. Click HERE to watch her sing live in Tampa, Florida.


