Morning Summary: Stocks are lower this morning and continue to move like the wind changes direction. Rumors started circulating yesterday that President Trump would probably NOT be meeting with Chinese President Xi while on his upcoming trip to Vietnam at the end of February, just ahead of the March 2 trade deadline. A senior administration official reportedly told the press that the presidents are still planning to meet but there's "too much work to do" in too short of a time period to flesh out a deal with China. The leaders set their March 2 deadline when they met in Argentina. While negotiators are making progress, officials said there's still much work to be done. Larry Kudlow, Director of the National Economic Council, followed that up yesterday by saying, President Trump "does expect to meet with Xi but when is totally up in the air. At some point they will meet, but that is off in the distance at the moment." As you can imagine, diminishing expectations for a nearby resolution to a U.S.-China trade spat, sparked fresh fears about a slowing global economy. As I've said several times, the stock market now finds itself in a precarious space. The U.S. economy remains strong but some of the data points have started to weaken. The Fed seems somewhat uncertain about their next move, going from hawkish to somewhat dovish almost overnight. The looming trade conflict with China also creates a ton of uncertainty. Bottom-line, I don't think anyone is arguing that the U.S. economy is going to fall apart any time soon, but earnings are flat on a forward looking basis and the stock market is currently asking for almost 17 times, which is a little rich for many "value" based investors. Meaning, if the stocks can't keep up with projected "growth" investors will not be willing to pay inflated premiums. It's not that companies are doing poorly or in trouble, rather just not certain they can keep growing at the pace they have the past few years. That's the big question with Apple stock. Can they continue to grow like they have during the past decade? Can Facebook continue to grow like it has now that they have to provide much more due diligence? Will Netflix continue to add new users and grow like it has in the past now that other big names like Disney, Amazon and Fox are jumping in the space? Again, this is why I'm being somewhat cautious in paying premium for "growth" right now. For full disclosure, I still own shares of Amazon, Alphabet, Apple, and Facebook, I've just trimmed down my exposure. I currently do not own any Netflix stock. There's very little in the way of traditional economic data scheduled for today. There's really not a lot of traditional economic data out next week either. We have the CPI on Wednesday and updated Retail Sales later in the week. I suspect the big ticket items will be the delegation of U.S. trade officials traveling to China to hopefully iron out a few more differences. Don't forget, we also have the U.S government budget deadline looming next Friday. If there's no compromise, we might be looking at another government shutdown. I'm personally keeping a close eye on the U.S. dollar. The thoughts have been, the Fed turning more dovish and the U.S. economy slowing a bit, would help pressure the dollar lower. Unfortunately, if other nations report even further slowing growth and their central banks become even more dovish than the U.S. Fed, the dollar, by default or proxy becomes the so called "best-ofbread" and will remain strong. Ultimately, that would create a headwind for the U.S. stock market and our global export business.

**1862, Battle of Roanoke Island -** On this day in 1862,
Union General Ambrose

Roanoke Island in North Carolina.It was one of the first major Union victories of the Civil War and gave the Yankees control of the mouth of Albemarle Sound, allowing them to threaten the Rebel capital of Richmond, Virginia, from the south. During the war's first winter, Union strategists focused their efforts on capturing coastal defenses to deny the Confederates sea outlets. In August 1861, the Yankees took two key forts on North Carolina's Outer Banks, paving the way for the campaign against Roanoke Island. On January 11, 1862, Burnside took a force of 15,000 soldiers and a flotilla of 80 ships down to the Outer Banks. The expeditionary force arrived at Hatteras Inlet on January 13, but poor weather delayed an attack for three weeks. On February 7, Burnside landed 10,000 troops on the island. They were met by about 2,500 Confederates. Burnside attacked, and his force overwhelmed the outer defenses of the island. Confederate Colonel Henry commander retreated to the north end of the island but had no chance to escape. On February 8, Shaw surrendered his entire force. The Yankees suffered 37 men killed and 214 wounded, while the Confederates lost 23 men killed and 62 wounded before the surrender. The Union now controlled a vital section of the coast. The victory came two days after Union General Ulysses S. Grant captured Fort Henry in northern Tennessee, and, for the first time in the war, the North had reason for optimism.



**1943, Americans Secure Guadalcanal -** On this day in 1943, Japanese troops evacuate Guadalcanal, leaving the island in Allied possession

after a prolonged campaign. The American victory paved the way for other Allied wins in the Solomon Islands. Guadalcanal is the largest of the out, as Apple briefly kicked iPhone users who work at Facebook and Google off much of their own software as part of a privacy dispute. Hostilities ended as quickly as they began — but the flare up reminded the world of just how completely, and complexly, the technologies and businesses of these giants are connected. The most valuable companies in the world — Apple, Google, Facebook, Amazon mostly stayed in their own lanes as they grew into giants. But now they're increasingly clashing as their growing ambitions bump into one another. If you understand where these giants clash and where they find common ground, you can begin to grasp how they are shaping our world. Apple was furious when it learned Facebook was abusing rules governing internal apps and quickly kicked the company out of the program, breaking Facebook's ability to test new apps and use internal iPhone apps. When it became clear Google was doing the same thing, Apple was in a bind. Facebook and Apple have few business ties. But Apple gets billions of dollars per year from Google in exchange for making it the default search engine on iPhones and Mac — an arrangement that Apple CEO Tim Cook has had to defend while promoting the company's strong pro-privacy stance. 
The Need for Speed! A publication called "The Drive" filed a public information request with the Texas Department of Public Safety for every single speeding ticket issued by Texas Highway Patrol troopers in excess of 120 mph in 2018. A couple weeks later, a lawyer for the department responded with a huge spreadsheet showing the date, location, vehicle, and speed for all 228 tickets fitting that description—plus extras like officer notes and the stop's exact GPS coordinates when available. The fastest? The driver of a 2003 Porsche 911, stopped for doing 166 mph in a 75 mph zone on June 10 in rural Carson County. The most unlikely? A 2013 Ford F-150 clocked at 150 mph just outside Fort Worth. And the best excuse? The driver of a 2018 Mazda CX-5, who claimed she was doing 123 mph in a 65 zone because she was "running late to take her daughter to the DPS office to get her driver['s] license." The full data also offers a peak at relative car performance. Those 122-129 mph tickets feature a healthy mix of vehicles, everything from a 2006 Honda Civic to 2015 Nissan 370Z to a 2018 Buick Encore. Above 130 mph, it's a lot of American muscle like the Dodge Challenger, a few determined pickup trucks, and an increasing number of sportbikes. And it probably won't shock you to learn the most commonly-ticketed car above 140 mph last year was the Ford Mustang. You can read more details at TheDrive

Solomons, a group of 992 islands and atolls, 347 of which are inhabited, in the South Pacific Ocean. The Solomons, which are located northeast of Australia and have 87 indigenous languages, were discovered in 1568 by the Spanish navigator Alvaro de Mendana de Nevra (1541-95). In 1893, the British annexed Guadalcanal, along with the other central and southern Solomons. The Germans took control of the northern Solomons in 1885, but transferred these islands, except for Bougainville and Buka (which eventually went to the Australians) to the British in 1900. The Japanese invaded the Solomons in 1942 during World War II and began building a strategic airfield on Guadalcanal. On August 7 of that year, U.S. Marines landed on the island, signaling the Allies' first major offensive against Japanese-held positions in the Pacific. The Japanese responded quickly with sea and air attacks. A series of bloody battles ensued in the debilitating tropical heat as Marines sparred with Japanese troops on land, while in the waters surrounding Guadalcanal, the U.S. Navy fought six major engagements with the Japanese between August 24 and November 30. In mid-November 1942, the five Sullivan brothers from Waterloo, Iowa, died together when the Japanese sunk their ship, the USS Juneau. Both sides suffered heavy losses of men, warships and planes in the battle for Guadalcanal. An estimated 1,600 U.S. troops were killed, over 4,000 were wounded and several thousand more died from disease. The Japanese lost 24,000 soldiers. On December 31, 1942, Emperor Hirohito told Japanese troops they could withdraw from the area; the Americans secured Guadalcanal about five weeks later. The Solomons gained their independence from Britain in 1978. In the late 1990s, fighting broke out between rival ethnic groups on Guadalcanal and continued until an Australian-led international peacekeeping mission restored order in 2003. Today, with a population of over half a million people, the Solomons are known as a scuba diver and fisherman's paradise.



**1978, New England Digs out after Blizzard -** A classic
"Nor'easter" storm that
brought a severe blizzard to
New England finally subsides

on this day in 1978, and the region begins to dig out from under several feet of snow. Over the previous 72 hours, some areas of Rhode Island and Massachusetts had received as many as 55 inches of snow. Three major weather systems all converged near the Atlantic Coast on February 5, and New York City was the first to be hit with a snowstorm. As the storm moved northeast, it stalled over Connecticut, Rhode Island and Massachusetts, catching many of the region's residents by surprise. It is estimated that 3,500 cars abandoned on Massachusetts streets and highways and several people died in their vehicles on Interstate 93 when they became trapped. A college hockey playoff

was played at the Boston Garden despite the weather, and many of the spectators were unable to return home. On February 6, the blizzard whipped up powerful sustained winds of up to 50 miles per hour with gusts of nearly 100 mph. Fiftyfoot waves on the Massachusetts coast wiped out seaside homes, while further north, in Maine, waves destroyed three lighthouses and an amusement pier. One of the hardest-hit communities in New England was Providence, Rhode Island, where travel became nearly impossible and Governor Joseph Garrahy ordered all businesses except grocery stores closed. Few of these stores had any food in stock, and eventually, supplies had to be airlifted in to Providence College. Similar conditions were found in areas of Boston, and looting broke out in some spots. Governor Michael Dukakis banned all cars from the roads because stuck vehicles were making it impossible for snow plows to clear the streets. In the end, 56 deaths between February 5 and February 8 were attributed to the blizzard. Thousands more people were left homeless. In one tragic incident, a young child died after becoming lost in the snow-although he was only yards from his home, he could not be located. This was the worst blizzard to hit New England since 1888.




- Option #1 Conservatively long.




## TODAY'S RIDDLE:

**Weather** over the past days has centered around rain, ice and snow that has engulfed much of the nation's mid-section. Now, however, at the end of the week cold, mostly dry weather will engulf the entire country, except for lingering warm in the Southeast. Early next week, temperatures will quickly rebound to above normal levels in the Deep South, but cold air will remain deeply entrenched across the North and West. Widespread precipitation will return early next week across the central and eastern U.S., with additional snow expected across the northern and central Plains and upper Midwest.


**Predicting Drought With Groundwater Data:** This maps shows the current dry or wet conditions, showing the probability of occurrence expressed as a percentile. Obviously lower values are red and mean dryer than normal and higher values are blue and mean wetter than normal. Interesting to see that large swaths of Missouri and Illinois that are indicating dryness and possible drought come springtime.

**Corn** traders are extremely eager to see todays USDA reports. There's really no reason to waste time and or talk about anything else. The biggest question looming are... How big of a reduction will the USDA make to old-crop average yield? How many acres will go unharvested? Will there be a reduction in their U.S. export estimate? How much further will they reduce their corn used for ethanol forecast? Will corn used for feed be lowered because of more alternative backing up in the pipeline? Will there be any change to South American production? Will the Ukraine corn production estimate be raised higher? As producers, we have to make certain we are prepared for potential extreme volatility as the market tries to quickly readjust to the updated USDA data. Any major move to the upside and I will be looking to reduce additional risk. A major knee-jerk reaction to the downside and I may look to re-own some previous sales. As a spec, I'm waiting to react to the market. I see no need in trying to out guess the USDA, there's simply too many moving parts and pieces being dropped on the market all at once. I will provide additional thoughts following the release of the data. "Aim low, they might be ridding shetlands..."


# **Argentina Corn Production & Exports**

Soybean traders are not only battling uncertainties surrounding Chinese trade, but also uncertainty surrounding todays USDA data dump. The market backpedaled yesterday on rumors that President Trump would not be meeting with Chinese President Xi anytime soon. To paraphrase, a senior leader in Washington said, there was still a lot of work that needed to be done and hurdles cleared before the two leaders get together. They don't see that happening anytime soon. President Trump also confided similar sentiment. The big question, is this simply more political jockeying ahead of next weeks meeting with U.S. trade representatives or are we really talking about a significant delay in finding a trade compromise? Here at home today, it's all about the USDA reports. How far will they lower U.S. old-crop yield? How many harvested acres will be taken out of the equation? How will they interpret Chinese demand and the current trade conflict? Will they aggressively lower U.S. exports and or Chinese imports? How big of reduction will be made to South American soybean production? Bottom-line, there's a ton of uncertainty and some subjective interpretation coming our direction. As producers, we have to make certain we are comfortable with our current risk profile. As a spec, similar to corn, I like the thought of placing my bets after the markets reaction, rather than trying to outguess the USDA. In other words, I'm hoping the trade overreacts to the data in one direction or the other, then I'll be looking to perhaps fade the initial wave. Be careful if your swimming in the water today, don't let yourself get too far out from the shore.


# **Brazil Soybean Production & Exports**

Wheat continues to dance to the beat of "two-steps forward" followed by "two-steps back". In other words, we continue to go nowhere and remain stuck towards the lowerend of the range. There was again disappointment as an Egyptian wheat tender was filled by supply from France and Romania. This allows the bears to continue pointing to burdensome U.S. supply and thoughts that the USDA will again be cutting their export estimate and perhaps bump ending stocks up closer to 1.0 billion bushels. On the flip side, bulls are hoping to see the USDA make a fairly significant cut to planted U.S. winter wheat acres. As a spec, I will be looking to add to my current bullish position if the market should make a significant knee-jerk reaction to the downside. I just feel like the downside risk is much less than that associated with potential upside reward. Bottom-line, I think we probably break off the headlines, but it might be tough to keep this market underwater for an extended period.

- > World Food Prices Rise in January: World food prices rose in January, buoyed by a rebound in dairy prices and stronger showings for vegetable oils and sugar, according to the UN Food and Agriculture Organization. The index, which measures monthly changes for a basket of cereals, oilseeds, dairy products, meat and sugar, averaged 164.8 points last month against 161.8 in December. Despite the rise, the index was still 2.2% below its January 2018 level. (Source: UN FAO)
- > Tyson Foods Misses on Quarterly Earnings: The largest U.S. meat processor --Tyson Foods -- missed Wall Street estimates for first-quarter revenue as the company was hit by lower average prices of pork, denting its sales. Sales in the company's pork business fell 8.1% as prices fell on average 4.6% compared to last year. Analysts point to China's retaliatory tariffs of more than 60% on pork having resulted in oversupplies of hogs in the U.S. as fewer producers ship them for Chinese consumption. (Source: Reuters)
- > How U.S. Ethanol can Reach China Tariff-Free: Current tariffs make direct transfers of U.S. ethanol to China unprofitable, but the fuel can enter China tariff-free if it arrives with a blend of at least 40% Asian-produced material, according to trade rules established by the regional economic and political body, the Association of Southeast Asian Nations. The trip for U.S. ethanol-to China now takes about two months and includes a ship-to-ship transfer and a stop in Malaysia before it arrives. The journey reflects a broader shift in global ethanol flows since the trade war with China begun last spring. Remember, China slapped retaliatory tariffs up to 70% on U.S. ethanol. (Source: Reuters)
- > U.S. Cotton Growers May Catch Business on India's Low Production: India's cotton production has fallen to a 9-year low due to dry weather and pests, prompting imports to hit 2.7 million bales. I'm told that India may export just 5 million bales of the fiber, a 27.5% plunge from last year's shipments, opening doors for U.S. cotton producers to move more product.
- > USDA Generates 166 New Inventions in 2017: According to the latest Report on Technology Transfer, USDA generated 166 new inventions and 68 patent applications in 2017. Innovations include tornado "safe rooms" built of cross-laminated wood, soybean germ plasm with heat-tolerant genes and tires fo rubber made from a flowering desert shrub. (Source: USDA)
- > Japan Culls 15,000 Hogs Due To Swine Fever Outbreak: Up to 15,000 hogs may be killed to quell an epidemic of classical swine fever, a highly contagious disease found in five prefectures. According to officials, this swine fever outbreak has nothing to do with the outbreak that China has been dealing with for months now.

- > Haagen-Dazs Announces Alcohol Infused Ice Cream Line: The collection includes five new flavors: Irish Cream Brownie, Rum Tres Leches, Bourbon Vanilla Bean Truffle, Stout Chocolate Pretzel Crunch, Bourbon Praline Pecan as well as Irish Cream Cookie Squares. It also includes a non-dairy options, Amaretto Black Cherry Almond Toffee. Each product contains less than 0.5% alcohol per volume. Because of the alcohol content, buyers must be 21 years or older to purchase the product in the U.S. (Source: CNBC)
- > Sears Gets Another Chance: Sears was granted a new lifeline on Thursday as its sale to Chairman Eddie Lampert, through an affiliate of his hedge fund ESL Investments, was approved by Judge Robert Drain. ESL has said the \$5.2 billion deal to buy the company will save 425 stores and roughly 45,000 jobs.
- > IHOP Name Change Last Summer Generated Sales: Results are in from last year's media buzz where IHOP teased that it would change its name to IHOb. From what I'm told, the company sold 500,000 burgers a week at its peak, four times as many as normal. Parent company Dine Brands reported that IHOP same-store sales grew by 1.2% during its third quarter, which ended Sept. 30.
- > Amazon Invests in Self-Driving Car Start-Up Aurora: Thursday Aurora annouced that it has raised more than \$530 million in funding, from investors including Amazon, Sequoia and the investment arm of energy giant Shell. Amazon spokesperson was quoted saying "We are always looking to invest in innovative, customer-obsessed companies, and Aurora is just that." "Autonomous technology has the potential to help make the jobs of our employees and partners safer and more productive, whether it's in a fulfillment center or on the road, and we're excited about the possibilities."
- > Uber Eats Already Delivering Billions:Uber CEO said "Uber Eats is on track to deliver some \$10 billion worth of food worldwide this year, up from an estimated \$6 billion-plus last year... it could generate at least \$1 billion in revenue this year, or an estimated 7% to 10% of the total. That means Uber Eats is already among the planet's largest food-delivery services." (Source: Forbes; DataTrek)
- > Johnson & Johnson will start giving the list price of its prescription drugs in TV ads, becoming the first pharmaceutical company to do so. First up would be blood thinner Xarelto, with commercials by late March ending with the drug's price plus typical out-of-pocket costs \$450-\$540 per month without insurance. The Trump administration has been pushing for this sort of disclosure, but drugmakers have argued back that few actually pay such high list prices. All seven major pharmaceutical players have agreed to testify to the Senate on February 26 about drug pricing. (Source: SeekingAlpha)
- > Fastest Growing Jobs in Each State: According to Yahoo Finance, the future is in not with robots, but with Solar Panel Installers. That is the fastest growing job in 8 states (California, Florida, Hawaii, New Mexico, North Carolina, Missouri, and surprisingly, Minnesota and New Jersey). The gig pays \$19 per hour or \$39,5k per year, and is projected to grow 105% till 2026 -- much faster than the national rate. Other clean energy jobs include Wind Turbine Technicians in Texas, Colorado. Nebraska and Iowa. **Southcentral Kansas** – I wanted to follow up on the winterkill concerns that I have read from some guys. The wheat in our area looks good. We got some nitrogen on a few days back when it was warmer and followed that with a nice shower to push it in. We generally don't have issues with winterkill unless the wheat is small and dry. Typically, if there's adequate moisture you will not see issues unless it drops to an unheard-of coldness. The only time winter kill is even a problem is when wheat comes out of dormancy and then the temperatures drop below freezing again.

**Southcentral South Dakota** – We are running cattle on corn stalks. They have been on the corn stalk since we were able to get the fence up after harvest. Surprisingly as cold as it been the cows are either maintaining or gaining weight. We decided to throw some hay out there when the temperatures dropped a few weeks ago but outside of that we have really just kept an eye on them. We are going to try and stretch the corn grazing to save money in feed and the cost of spreading manure. Normally we bring them home around the 25th of January, but we are going to run them another 3 weeks from today.

**Southern Wisconsin** – We had issues with too much rain this year like most guys in our area. We didn't think we needed fungicide and a we had a bunch of corn down by the end of harvest. We were told by our agronomist that the problem was disease. We saw more planes in the air than any other year, but we didn't want to spend the money to fly anything on and there was no high boys available to spray on fungicide. We are going to rotate our crops pretty much the same as normal besides we picked up a quarter of ground that will need to go beans so we will have about 150 acres more beans then last year.

Why Some Consider 2019 The Year of the Mushroom: Mushrooms have been a staple food in international cuisines for thousands of years. Though most people are only familiar with a handful of varieties, there are at least 350 species of fungi collected and eaten around the world. 
What the Autonomous Vehicle Industry can Learn from Elevator History: If you work in an office or live in an apartment building, you probably ride in an elevator several times a day without even thinking about it. You push the button for your floor, the doors close and off you go. It's totally normal. But it didn't seem so in America a century ago: most people were not prepared to travel in an elevator without an operator. At the time, most lifts needed to be started and stopped manually. It took a bit of skill to align a lift with a particular floor, so a lift operator was required to guide it to its destination, and opened and closed the doors. In the 1890s, some buildings attempted to introduce fully automatic push-button elevators. But they failed to gain traction. Some people flat-out refused to ride in the operatorless kind, considering them unsafe. Moving forward to today, that bit of history can offer a valuable lesson to designers of driverless cars today. As with elevators, many people are reluctant to get into a car without a driver: 73% of Americans say they are afraid to travel in an autonomous vehicle. Riders need reassurance that they are safe. Scientist's Search for the Origins of Consciousness: Humans have learned to travel through space, eradicate diseases and understand nature at the breathtakingly tiny level of fundamental particles. In fact, while scientists have been preoccupied with understanding consciousness for centuries, it remains one of the most important unanswered questions of modern neuroscience. Determining whether a patient is "aware" after suffering a severe brain injury is a huge challenge both for doctors and families who need to make decisions about care. 







# Something I've Never Heard of... Dangerous Rivers In the Sky

Several times year an atmospheric river -- a long, narrow conveyor belt of storms that stream in relentlessly from the Pacific Ocean -- drops inches of rain or feet of snow on the U.S. west coast. Such a system triggered floods and mudslides in central and southern California recently. Yet only in the past few years have weather forecasters been able to better understand, identify and predict roughly how strong the imminent storms may be. Now there's a new rating system to help forecasters -- and the public -understand what an income atmospheric river might unleash. They are calling it the "atmospheric river scale" and it ranks severity and impacts, from category-1 (weak) to category-5 (exceptional). Understand, an atmospheric river flows through the sky about a mile above the oceans surface, and may extend across a thousand miles of ocean to the coast. Some bring routine rains but the more intense systems can carry as much water as 15 Mississippi Rivers. The series of storms striking land can arrive and stay for days or, occasionally, weeks on end. They hit west-facing coastlines worldwide, although the U.S. experiences more than most other national coasts. This will greatly help assess how serious potential flooding might be -- or, at times, if the rain or snow will actually be advantageous or extremely dangerous. Understand, atmospheric rivers aren't always hazardous. Many farms, particularly out West, can and do find atmospheric rivers help revive dry soils and fortify municipal water supplies. As for predicting atmospheric rivers, that is another big challenge. Scientists need to better understand how atmospheric rivers fit within the larger weather systems around them. From what I understand, the American Meteorological Society is already training weather casters on ways to use the new tool. It's crazy how quickly technology is advancing in the weather space. In just the past few years I feel like we've seen some major leaps forward. (Source: Phys.org)





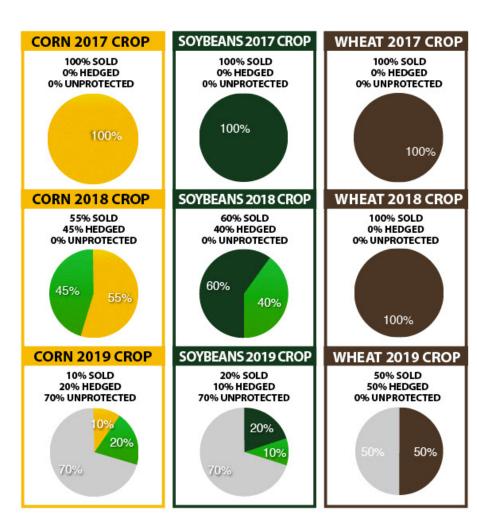
